

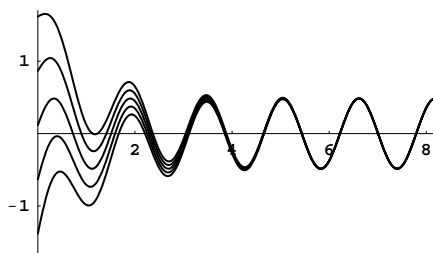
More on the method of the lucky guess

Example 2. $\frac{dy}{dt} = -y + 2 \cos 4t$

Last class we computed the general solution for this equation, and we got

$$y(t) = \frac{2}{17} \cos 4t + \frac{8}{17} \sin 4t + ce^{-t}.$$

Here are graphs of a few solutions:



What causes all of them to approach the same “limiting” graph?

One more example of the guessing technique:

Example 3. $\frac{dy}{dt} = -3y + 2e^{-3t}$

1. General solution of the associated homogeneous equation:

2. Particular solution of the nonhomogeneous equation (trick question):

By now you should know that guessing $y_p(t) = \alpha e^{-3t}$ is a bad idea. We should guess $y_p(t) = \alpha t e^{-3t}$ instead.

The method of integrating factors

For this method we rewrite the nonhomogeneous equation

$$\frac{dy}{dt} = a(t)y + b(t)$$

as

$$\frac{dy}{dt} + g(t)y = b(t).$$

In other words, $g(t) = -a(t)$. There is no mathematical significance to this step. It just avoids an annoying minus sign in one of the formulas.

Now for some magic:

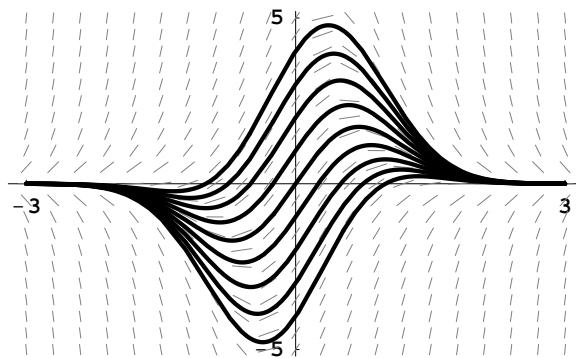
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Summary: Given a linear differential equation of the form

$$\frac{dy}{dt} + g(t)y = b(t),$$

the integrating factor (magic function) is $\mu(t) = e^{\int g(t) dt}$.

Example. $\frac{dy}{dt} = -2ty + 4e^{-t^2}$



Recall one of the examples that we did at the start of class.

Example 3. $\frac{dy}{dt} = -3y + 2e^{-3t}$

Now we have two methods for solving nonhomogeneous linear equations. How do we decide which method to use?

Method of integrating factors:

1. In theory, it always works.
2. But you must calculate two integrals.

Method of the lucky guess:

1. Tends to be faster than the method of integrating factors—mostly algebra.
2. Note that the examples that we considered were all of the form

$$\frac{dy}{dt} = a(t)y + b(t)$$

where $a(t)$ was a constant function (“constant-coefficient case”). What types of functions $b(t)$ did we consider?

3. But you need to be lucky.
